


"The general principles on which the fathers achieved independence were the general


Thomas Jefferson


I am a real Christian – that is to say, a disciple of the doctrines of Jesus Christ.



rely exclusively upon it.



Everyone elected and appointed to office shall make and subscribe the following declaration, to wit:

"I do profess faith in God the Father, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, and in the Holy Ghost, one God, blessed forever more, and I do acknowledge the holy scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be given by divine inspiration."

Delaware State Constitution

"Each member [of the legislature], before he takes his seat, shall make and subscribe the following declaration, viz: I do believe in one God, the Creator and Governor of the universe, the rewarder of the good and the punisher of the wicked, and I do acknowledge the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be given by Divine Inspiration."

Pennsylvania State Constitution

[All persons elected must]

"make and subscribe the following declaration, viz:

"I do declare that I believe the Christian religion and have firm persuasion of its truth."

Massachusetts State Constitution

"No person who shall deny the being of God, or the truth of the Christian religion, or the divine authority either of the Old or New Testaments or who shall hold religious principles incompatible with the freedom and safety of the state, shall be capable of holding any office or place of trust or profit in the civil department, within the state."
